

Hope to thrive...


...like **Sherry** (pg 6) who is breaking generational poverty through hard work and participating in a program funded in part by a grant from the Choose Henry Fund,

Garden Club Brings

New Life to Abandoned Land





IN HENRY COUNTY,

a group of caring citizens and organizations are working together to make a change through the Blight Elimination Program*.

This project began as the lot of a burned-down, abandoned house. The group had a vision for what the space could become but lacked the resources. That's when Raintree Habitat for Humanity applied for and received a Henry County Community Foundation grant to help start a community garden.

After receiving funding from a Choose Henry Flex Fund grant, Alan McCraine and Jerry Cash led the group to build planters and use organic materials like cardboard, branches and leaves to create a good garden base. From there, they offered the garden spots up to people in the neighborhood.

When Parker Elementary third grade teacher, Kelly Harvey, heard about the community gardens, she called Alan with an idea to bring students out to the gardens. He was thrilled at the prospect and has remained involved throughout the process.

Eight students from Parker Elementary turned in applications to participate - Jazy Dudley, Adriana Guerrero, Sy Hinshaw, Makenna House, Kei'Mari Leath, Bentley Lindquist, Cambree Powers, and Brody Slavey. After creating the club, Kelly decided to obtain a mini-bus driver's license, and in the Spring of 2021, she started bringing the students out to the gardens.

"Rarely are children given the opportunity to engage in the community and give back. I thought it would be cool for my students to have something to be a part of and to be able to feel proud of and show their parents," expressed Kelly.

In the midst of covid restrictions and the unusual school year, the garden was a safe space for students to gather. Kei'mari and her mom, Keshia, often came to visit, and Kei'Mari noted how much it meant to her to be out and about, "I love getting to leave my house and see my friends."

The garden club continued to meet over the summer. For about half an hour every week, they would come to water and weed. Some parents were able to join them in the work too. Together, they experienced cutting zinnias and watching them grow back stronger. And they found out about growing and eating herbs.

Another student, Sy Hinshaw, shared, "We got to garden a lot of things that we don't garden at my house. If we didn't do it here, I wouldn't have known what it tastes like. We got to explore nature!"

They even sent home bouquets of flowers. Jazy Dudley thought that part of the experience was especially great. "It's fun! You get to grow flowers and food, and then you get to take them home after you cut and pick them," she said.

In August, the garden club got to show off the fruits of their labor. Committee volunteers, students, parents, and school representatives all came out to see how great the gardens were doing. They gave away fresh cantaloupe and tomatoes. The New Castle Career Center provided salads and snacks. Alan and Kelly both shared about the great experience of hosting the garden club.

The Henry County committee of volunteers consists of ICAP, Healthy Communities, Habitat for Humanity, Hope Initiative, New Castle Housing Authority, Jerry Walden City Council, and several local realtors and individuals.*





Business Connection Leads to *Lasting Impact*

KEVIN BROWN describes himself as a “standard Henry County Person.” Born and raised here, Kevin knew he wanted to build a family and a business in the community he always considered home.

After completing mortuary school, Kevin worked at Main and Frame Funeral home, where Mark Frame served as a mentor to him.

From there, Kevin and Phil Hinsey decided to open a funeral home together. In order to find more connection with the community, Kevin began visiting optimist groups. He recalled, “I love being involved in things, and everywhere I went, Herb Bunch was there talking about the Henry County Community Foundation. He shared how things worked and turned me on to the concept of the Foundation.”

A financially minded thinker, Kevin was naturally drawn to the work of the Foundation when he heard Herb share about the power of endowment.

He explained, “I love the fact that the money stays local and is perpetual. It’s something that will always be here and always be growing. The more it grows, the more it produces. It’s a big snowball, but in a good way.

I’ve seen it work! It’s what Herb would talk about so much.

And in the last 25 years, I’ve watched money grow and make a difference in the community. It’s great!”

This strong belief in the way gifts are managed and poured back into Henry County inspired Kevin to start a fund with his business, The Hinsey-Brown Endowed Scholarship Fund. “Several years ago, when we started the scholarship fund, it gave the staff something to be excited to build. We worked together to get it endowed. Now that we have achieved that, we can enjoy seeing it go out to students,” shared Kevin.

But Kevin’s enthusiasm for HCCF doesn’t stop there; he and his wife, Cindy, have decided to include the Foundation in their will. He expressed, “I am an advocate for growth, and I feel very strongly about the success of New Castle and Henry County. I think the Foundation is a huge engine driving us toward positive change. I love seeing all of the ways the Foundation is providing for the community.”

Through the hard work of Herb Bunch many years ago, Kevin Brown has started his legacy as a donor and advocate for the Foundation. He carries on the hope and inspiration of Herb’s speeches through his commitment with his family and with his business to make a difference in Henry County!

PATHWAY OF HOPE

WHEN *SHERRY WAS GRANTED custody of her grandchildren, she was working at a factory and trying to handle her own physical and mental needs. She hadn't been planning to make any significant life changes. But once she saw her family's needs, she knew it was time to go back to school.

Sherry decided to work toward a Certified Nursing Assistant's (CNA) certification. Unfortunately, she couldn't afford daycare, and she had to be especially careful about who could watch her grandchildren.

Desperate to provide a safe home, financial stability, and an improved lifestyle for her grandchildren, she found Pathway of Hope with the Salvation Army.

Pathway of Hope is a program that all Salvation Army organizations offer. It's an initiative to provide individualized services to families with children who want to break the cycle of crisis and overcome challenges like unemployment, unstable housing, educational needs, and much more.

Local director, Beth Stamper, described the Pathway of Hope program, "We teach them to write out a budget or help them learn how to cook or take them to visit Ivy Tech and learn about classes. Often, they need someone to partner with them and help them get through the steps they need to reach their goals. Many of our Pathway families know what they want and might even know how to get it. It's almost like they just don't feel like they're worthy of it."

She went on to share, "It's for people who need help getting out of the rut. We help give them the tools they need to know how to get out of the rut. So, if they ever get stuck again, they can go to their toolboxes and remember that they know how to get out of it."

Beth met Sherry when she was halfway through completing her CNA certificate. They would meet weekly through the program for encouragement and assistance. Beth recalls, "When she passed her CNA class - we were all cheering! She just hit the ground running and works full time now. She's amazing, and the kids are doing really well. We continue to meet with her!"

Sherry and countless others are seeing positive, lasting changes in their families thanks to the help of the Pathway of Hope program.


Generational curses are being broken, lives are being impacted, and the community is growing.

How does it work?

committed to bringing hope and purpose to young people all over the world. It's a Christian ministry that reaches out to middle school and high school students in Henry County. Beyond ministry, it provides a safe place for kids to grow up and feel loved and empowered.

Regan shared her experience, "I felt included and like I had a place to grow and feel encouraged every week by the leaders. My leaders walked alongside me and helped me with my relationship with the Lord and others."

Not only did her involvement with Young Life make a difference in her high school experience, but it also left a lasting impact on her and the many lives she's reached since. She recalled, "When I graduated high school, I was so impacted by Young Life that I decided to become a Young Life leader in college. I was able to build relationships with students and walk alongside them. Because of how Young Life impacted me, I was able to teach and show students the love of Jesus and the power of a positive community."

Experiences like Regan's are exactly what the McGlothlin's hoped to empower and encourage through establishing a designated fund with the Henry County Community Foundation.

After moving to the community in 1979, Wylie and Ann McGlothlin quickly fell in love with New Castle and its friendly citizens. As they established their roles in Henry County, they became more involved in organizations, including the Foundation.

Having spent a total of six years serving on the Foundation's Board of Directors, Ann was approached about the idea of beginning a fund of her own. She and

Wylie saw it as a great way to support two causes they care about, the Community Foundation and Young Life.

Ann explained further, "Young Life is a great ministry. We were involved with it for many years. Initially, Young Life struggled to make its budget. As we became involved, we pulled more people in with us to help expand the budget. Now, it's phenomenal to see what Young Life is able to do!"

As the Wylie G. and J. Ann McGlothlin Fund has continued to grow over the years, so has the local Young Life organization. "They're more involved in schools now. The outreach for kids that need somewhere safe to go during their teenage years is incomparable," shared Ann.

Young Life is fully funded through donations. Yearly contributions from this fund make a big difference in their operations. Area Director, Katie Kinnaird, expressed her gratitude, "We appreciate the McGlothlin Fund so much because it provides Henry County Young Life with stable and consistent funding every year. We have to do a lot of fundraising, and having income from the McGlothlin Fund gives our annual budget a boost, year after year! It's a dependable, sustainable investment in our organization. Wylie and Ann have made an investment that will benefit local kids for years to come!"

Wylie and Ann were thankful for a way to sow seeds of hope in the community by continually giving back to kids in Henry County through their fund. Ann stated, "The Foundation does so much for the community. If you have a cause that's dear to your heart, think about establishing a fund. It benefits lots of people in the long term. It continues to grow and benefit your cause forever. Other people can join in and donate to your cause through the fund too!"



Flexibility of Fund Provides for Ever-Changing Needs

WHEN DICK AND BONNIE MYERS established their fund with the Henry County Community Foundation in 2003, they knew the needs in the community would change over time. By setting up the Richard Myers and Bonnie Myers Donor Advised Fund, they gave themselves, and their family, the flexibility to respond to pressing needs as they developed.

This plan for giving isn't surprising for a couple who loved the community and sought to make a difference through their lives. Dick and Bonnie Myers always taught their children the responsibility and importance of giving back to the community. While Dick was still living, he delighted in being able to give to others.

Through the creation of the endowment fund at the Foundation, this spirit of giving aid to Henry County continues. Though he is gone now, the fund is carried on through his family. His wife, Bonnie, and their daughters, Penny York and Brenda Armstrong are continuing to sow seeds of hope through the fund he established.

How does it work?

- You select a name for your fund.
- Establish your Donor Advised Fund with a minimum of \$25,000.
- Don't worry about identifying your charitable beneficiary immediately, instead, recommend grants when you decide on an eligible nonprofit.
- Gifts are invested and stewarded to provide annual grant dollars for your charitable giving.



Penny explained, "It can help to fund worthy projects. Any charitable organization with a mission and quality leadership can benefit. It's the gift that keeps on giving since the principle is never touched and projects are funded through the dividends."

The family has found enjoyment in being able to help with various projects around the county. Penny and Brenda are proud that their parents' fund has helped with things like the fountain in the New Castle downtown plaza, a middle school math program, a pavilion for New Castle athletes, activities at the Basketball Hall of Fame, and support for students in the music department at New Castle Schools.

Assisting with these great projects has meant a lot to the Myers family. They especially appreciate the value in giving through an endowed fund and watching it grow and continue to make a difference. Penny expressed, "Our family will be able to help our community thrive for years to come. The donor advised fund is a safe and effective way to give back to your community indefinitely and our family is thrilled my parents found a way to continue to give back with their resources into perpetuity."

Grateful Scholarship Students Return to Make a Difference in Their Home Schools

WITH A HEART FOR EDUCATION, Stacia needed to complete a college degree to fulfill her hope of making a difference in the lives of local students. Though her passion for teaching extends back through generations in her family, Stacia found the financial burden of attending a university to be daunting.

While graduating from Tri Junior-Senior High school, she decided to apply for scholarships through the Henry County Community Foundation and received the William F. Byrket Scholarship. She recalled, "Without the help from scholarships, it would have been a much greater obstacle for me to attend college."

It was a similar passion for education that inspired William, Maude, and Arista Byrket to establish this scholarship in 1943. Through the power of perpetuity, this fund has grown exponentially. What began as a \$10,000 trust fund donation has expanded to \$1,400,000 and benefits Henry County students each year.

This fund has reached thousands of students over the years, helping them to fulfill their educational goals. Goals like Stacia's dream of sowing seeds of hope and success in the lives of local students.




After more than 20 years of teaching in the community, Stacia (Mullins) Guarisco continues to feel honored by the gift of scholarship. She shared, "It helped me see that I had a community that cared about me and my future. The Henry County Community Foundation was supporting me, and that made my education an act of gratitude. It pushed me on and gave me hope for the future. I wanted to succeed for more than myself. And I hope I can continue to make a difference in the same way with my students."



Stacia isn't the only Byrket recipient to come back and leave a mark on our community. Henry County has been fortunate to see many of these students graduate and return to the

community to carry on the Byrket family's passion for education and investing in the lives of students.

Though it's been 20 years since graduating from New Castle High School, Jacob White still remembers his senior honors program and what it felt like to receive the Byrket Scholarship. He expressed, "I was truly humbled and grateful for the scholarship and the possibilities that it would unlock. I don't think I realized the magnitude of a four-year scholarship at the time. But the Byrket Scholarship gave me the freedom to focus on my academics and participate in soccer and leadership opportunities on campus."



The Byrket Scholarship eased the financial stress of attending college and helped Jacob succeed and obtain his degree from Franklin College. After graduating, he was able to pursue his passion. He shared, "I returned to New Castle when I was offered my dream job of teaching 8th grade U.S. History and coaching varsity soccer. While I was offered positions in other communities, the opportunity to teach in my hometown and this community was an opportunity I could not pass on. I have greatly enjoyed working for New Castle Schools and living in this community with my wife and daughters."

Jacob has since shifted roles from teaching to administration. He currently serves as the principal of New Castle Middle School where he is sowing seeds of hope in both educators and the next generation of students.

The Byrkets made a choice nearly 80 years ago to give what they could to invest in the lives of students then and now. They would have no way of knowing how many students like Stacia and Jacob would benefit from this decision. Because of their gift of renewable dollars through the Foundation, not only are students able to fulfill their hopes for a college education, but the community will continue to thrive when they return to Henry County and carry on the legacy set before them through donors like the Byrkets.



Caine Grant Helps Keep Christmas Traditions Alive!

“**HOW TO DEAL** with the holiday hustle and bustle” is just one example of the type of article that can be found around Christmastime. But the holiday hustle and bustle is not something that all families in Henry County experience. For some, dinner together with friends or a visit from Santa might seem like a rare or even impossible event.

Organizations like Healthy Families are working to provide some hopeful holiday events for Henry County kids. Healthy Families is a home living program for moms and their babies. They give support to local moms through regular meetings, periodic screenings, consistent curriculum, and referrals to resources like pregnancy care center and food pantries. They come alongside women in their parenting journey and give them encouragement.

Each year, Healthy Families hosts a special Christmas dinner. “A lot of our families aren’t invited to social events. They don’t always have something special to do at Christmas. We have a full meal together and Santa always comes. He brings presents and sings songs with the kids. It’s a great opportunity for our kids and families to be a part of something in the community,” shared Henry County Healthy Families supervisor, Kathy Jewell.



This evening has become a tradition for Healthy Families, but the funding for it has changed over the years. Sometimes it’s a struggle to pull it together. When Kathy heard about the grant from the Harold E. and Imogene L. Caine Memorial Fund through the Henry County Community Foundation e-newsletter, she thought it would be a great help for them.

The Harold E. and Imogene L. Caine Memorial Fund was established at the Foundation in 2002 through a donation from the Estate of Harold E. Caine. Born the oldest of three boys in Sulphur Springs, Harold Caine was described as the “life of the party with a sunny disposition. He was always ready to laugh. But he was also concerned for children who didn’t have much during the holidays.” With that passion to help children have brighter holidays, Harold included the Henry County Community Foundation in his will.

Over the years, the fund has continued to grow and give back to the community. Organizations like Healthy Families, Westminster, ICAP, Christian Love Center, and many more have been able to use grant money from the Harold E. and Imogene L. Caine Memorial Fund to provide food, clothes, and toys for Henry County children.

Kathy expressed, “this grant helped us to be able to have the party for our families. After our other funding ran out, we needed a new source. The Caine grant helped us carry on with the tradition. The families really appreciate it. We’re really grateful!”

Through the gift in his estate, Harold Caine’s legacy carries on in our community and local families will benefit from his generosity for years to come!

Teacher Excellence Award 2021

GROWING UP IN OHIO, Michelle first lived in Indiana while attending Anderson University. She loved her time here, and when a teaching position opened with Shenandoah Community Schools, she explained how excited she was that it was “in the middle of a cornfield.”

After teaching for two years in an urban school near Cleveland, Ohio, she came back to the area. For the last 20 years, Michelle has made Henry County her home; she stated, “Shenandoah has become our family, our people. My children go to school here, my husband coaches here, I am now having children of former students in a class (I call them my “grandstudents.”) Our lives are intertwined in this community.”

As a teacher, Michelle has impacted many students, which shows through her hard work and dedication to student success. Her impact was proven in 2021 when she received the Teacher Excellence Award.

The Teacher Excellence Award is given each year from a fund at the Henry County Community Foundation which was opened by generous, private donors. Anyone in the community can nominate a teacher from Henry County to receive this.

On Wednesday of Teacher Appreciation Week, all students and staff were called to the school cafeteria. Michelle described how she thought they might give the teachers free cafeteria food but was confused about what was going on. As the speaker was reading, Michelle realized the kind words were written about her. “As they started reading the description,

it dawned on me they were describing me; warmth just filled my heart, and I thought I would burst. Those sweet words that my students wrote were a balm to my soul,” she said.

Michelle also shared how she watches “Mr. Holland’s Opus” before every school year to remind herself of the importance her role is to the students. When they read those nice words for her, and everyone started clapping, she felt like the scene at the end of this movie. “It is certainly a highlight of my life that I will treasure always. And the beautiful plaque and flowers and the generous gift made it feel like a dream... and were much better than cafeteria food,” Michelle added.

According to Michelle, this year has been the most challenging year of her entire teaching career, as many teachers felt in 2020. The pandemic significantly altered the way teachers could interact with their students, Michelle worked countless hours ensuring that her students got the help they needed. “In a year in which I was very unsure of myself as a teacher if I was even making a difference, this award has validated that love can be communicated through Zoom and Canvas and YouTube. In a year when I felt that I had poured so much into my students, this award was a refreshing drink of water that filled me up. I feel seen and appreciated, and it is absolutely lovely,” Michelle shared.
